What happens next?

We have now completed our review of Haringey Council.

The recommendations must now be approved by Parliament. A draft order - the legal document which brings into force our recommendations - will be laid in Parliament.

Subject to parliamentary scrutiny, the new electoral arrangements will come into force at the local elections in May 2022.



Final recommendations on the new electoral arrangements



Who we are:

- The Local Government Boundary Commission for England is an independent body set up by Parliament.
- We are not part of government or any political party.
- We are accountable to Parliament through a committee of MPs chaired by the Speaker of the House
- Our main role is to carry out electoral reviews of local authorities throughout England.

Why Haringey?

- Haringey currently has high levels of electoral inequality: some councillors represent many more - or many fewer - voters than others.
- Therefore the value of your vote, in Haringey council elections, varies depending on where you live in the
- We are seeking to improve levels of electoral equality for local voters

Electoral review:

An electoral review examines and proposes new electoral arrangements for a local authority, including:

- The total number of councillors representing the council's voters ('council size').
- The names, number and boundaries of wards or electoral divisions.
- The number of councillors for each ward or division.

Our proposals:

- Haringey Council currently has 57 councillors. Based on the evidence we received, we recommend that **57 councillors** should serve the council in the future.
- We believe our final recommendations meet our statutory criteria to:
- (1) Deliver electoral equality for voters.
- (2) Reflect community interests and identities.
- (3) Promote effective and convenient local government.

Summary of our recommendations

Our final recommendations propose that Haringey Council should have **57** councillors.

We have considered all of the comments we received in our draft recommendations consultation, and have been persuaded to make some changes to our recommendations. We are recommending that there should be 15 three-councillor wards and six two-councillors wards. The boundaries of all wards should change, none will stay the same. An outline of the proposals is shown in the map to the right.

The areas most affected by changes to our recommendations are where our two-councillor wards for Alexandra Park, Bounds Green, the Gardens and Hermitage areas, Muswell Hill, Seven Sisters and St Ann's have enabled us to reflect the evidence of the character and communities of Fortis Green and the Harringay Ladder in our ward boundaries. We have also responded to comments about Hornsey Vale to make changes to our recommendations there.
